# What are the most important ways the City of Kingston can engage with arts and culture through strategic planning, policy, investment, programming, etc.?

Arts and culture need to be fundamental components of city planning. Arts vision, strategies, priorities, and programs must be developed with community experts and practitioners. Long-term funding is needed to sustain high-quality arts programs and facilities. Finally, municipalities should collect data on arts activities and outcomes at a local level. Greater investment in neighborhood arts and culture could come from reallocation or incremental expansion from existing programs and funding streams. But creative ways for incorporating arts in both public and private initiatives should be explored, including tourism taxes, as the arts are a driving force of the region's tourism economy. Participatory budgeting should be considered as a way for residents to drive creative programming in their neighborhoods. Partnerships with institutions, such as hospitals, universities, and museums, could bring additional resources. And, in order for communities to engage in creative placemaking, they should consider grants from the National





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Endowment for the Arts or ArtPlace America. The arts must be incorporated in Kingston's tourism strategy. Cultural tourism is becoming increasingly popular and thus becoming a key component of economic growth.

Do you support continued funding for arts and culture in the municipal budget? Yes. We need to ensure that the arts and culture sector gets the funding they need to help small businesses and the rest of the city to recover from the pandemic. We were in social isolation for too long. The arts and culture provides community-building powers that can help combat feelings of anxiety and social isolation.
